

The Mabel Tapp Prize Rules

Establishment

This prize was established in 1972 by Adrian Lynda Tapp who bequeathed the proceeds from the sale of her property to the University of Adelaide to establish an annual prize in mathematics to be called "The Mabel Tapp Prize" in commemoration of her sister, Mabel Tapp.

This is an endowed prize with the capital held in the University's Endowment Fund¹ and the income distribution each year used to fund the prize.

Value

The value of the prize is \$1,500 per year, or such other amount as the University shall from time to time determine provided that the value of the prize does not exceed the annual distribution of interest available from the Endowment Fund.

Eligibility

To be eligible for the Prize, students must have successfully completed Mathematical Methods and Specialist Mathematics undertaken as part of the South Australian Certificate of Education in the year prior to that in which the Prize is awarded.

Selection of Candidate

The Prize will be awarded to the student who achieved the highest academic merit in Mathematical Methods and Specialist Mathematics.

Should there be more than one candidate of equal merit, the prize may be shared equally.

Variations

The University may vary the rules from time to time in a manner consistent with the University's legal obligations and policies.
